The measure of a company's value to a community extends beyond the products and services that it provides. Community involvement, especially Carolina Sunrock's outreach to schools, has always been one of our President Bryan Pfohl's priorities. Working with school officials to introduce real-life opportunities for employment to students while providing value-added, educational experiences fosters long-term, mutually beneficial relationships between Carolina Sunrock and the communities we serve.

The folks at Carolina Sunrock support school programs by participating in events that bring us together with educators and students who are looking to make career choices. Ronnie Goswick, Carolina Sunrock's Director of Business and Economic Development, has been a driving force for community engagement by coordinating our participation in school activities such as advisory board meetings, virtual public school videos, job fairs, field trips, graduations and speaking engagements.

The Heavy Equipment and Transportation Technology (H.E.A.T.T.) program at Wake Tech Community College has been one of the focal points of Ronnie's efforts. Having been in operation for 25 years, the H.E.A.T.T. program is the longest running program of its kind in the country. Many programs similar to that of H.E.A.T.T. have not experienced the same longevity, which sets it apart from its competitors. It is also one of 22 such programs to receive Associated Equipment Distributors (AED) accreditation. Each year, Wake Tech selects a few companies to send a speaker to present to two H.E.A.T.T. classes about what their organizations do and the employment opportunities that exist. Speakers are also asked to cover real-world expectations and some desired soft skills required for success.

It has been my honor to represent Carolina Sunrock and serve as speaker to the faculty and students of the Wake Tech H.E.A.T.T. program for the last two years. It is easy to talk to budding technicians and equipment operators about all the great people who work at Sunrock, our operations, our facilities, our fleets, our career opportunities and benefits, and the fleet technical challenges we have overcome. The real challenge is to craft a presentation that adds value to the students' educational experience and reinforces the soft skills that their instructors work so hard to instill. Some of the soft skills covered in the presentation focus on interview etiquette: eye contact, smiling and an excited demeanor, all of which are soft skills that Carolina Sunrock desires in potential employees. Our presentations not only highlight Carolina Sunrock's core values and all the great career opportunities, they also convey real-world technical concepts and information that help students and instructors get a better handle on high-tech equipment and truck issues, all while tying it into the products and services that Carolina Sunrock offers. For example, our presentations cover the importance of trap rock and the role it plays in Carolina Sunrock's products and services.

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An important part of each session includes instruction on how to use power words and phrases in a resume, as well as how to present one's self at an interview using a firm handshake, good posture, positive attitude, respectful language and a smile. We then talk about employer expectations as we lead into an open and frank discussion on work ethic, professional behavior and the effects of social media in the work place – the do's and don'ts.

Each session ends with the presentation of Carolina Sunrock hats. As the students exit the classroom, they present themselves to me as if meeting for a job interview. Each student stands up straight, looks me in the eye, gives me a broad smile and firmly shakes my hand with confidence. Each then receives a hat as both a token of appreciation and memento of our time together. However, the value with which the faculty and students hold Carolina Sunrock's contributions is best summed up by Ian Gibbons, the Wake Tech Employer Relations Coordinator, who has

referred to Carolina Sunrock as, "the Gold Standard by which all other companies are measured."

Giving something back to the students and faculty in the form of value-added experiences, real-world technical information, soft skills and a gift creates a familiar bond of trust that is evident months later when participating in the annual Wake Tech H.E.A.T.T. job fair. Being able to give back to the community since 2006 through the H.E.A.T.T. program is a great way for me, both personally and professionally, to give back to an industry that has given me so much. Perhaps, what is most rewarding is to receive so many graduating students' resumes and applications for full-time positions as operators and technicians. In fact, two students of the program have gone on to become Carolina Sunrock employees. Additionally, first year students have also shown great interest in internships and part-time positions. This is just one example of how Carolina Sunrock leads the way.

An important goal of this project is to improve the capacity of the gravity interceptors within the system. Carolina Sunrock has been supplying all the aggregates for this project. All combined aggregates for this project will be approximately 50,000 tons. This project will allow for an enhanced transportation system of the wastewater. The total contract time for the project is 760 days. We cannot wait to see the completed project!



K-Flex USA Expansion

K-Flex USA is an Italian-based company that is a manufacturer of flexible elastomeric foam, a product that is typically used for insulation. K-Flex recently doubled the size of their operation in Youngsville, North Carolina, with the addition of a 360,000 square foot manufacturing and storage facility. Located in Wake Forest, Focus Design Builders was the general contractor for this project that was completed in just under nine months. Precision Concrete and Layout was the subcontractor in charge of finishing the concrete floors and exterior concrete paving. Carolina Sunrock supplied over 12,000 cubic yards of concrete to Precision Concrete on this project out of our North Raleigh Facility. Carolina Sunrock also supplied approximately 30,000 tons of stone out of the Kittrell Quarry to various sites and utility contractors, which includes Moffat Pipe, located in Wake Forest.

Woodsdale Asphalt Plant

The Woodsdale Asphalt Plant brings new opportunities to Carolina Sunrock! With a strong desire to service the Person County and the surrounding areas, Carolina Sunrock has made serious progress toward supporting that goal in the last several months. We erected and put a new asphalt plant into use in 2017 that replaced a former asphalt plant. Carolina Sunrock purchased the plant in Arkansas, and a team of Sunrock employees moved the plant to Woodsdale. Greg Kraemer added a combination of parts from Barber Green, Stansteel, TelSmith and Gencor to design it for our

specific purposes. The plant was put into operation at the end of last season to supply asphalt for our Contracting Division's Person County road improvements. Additionally, Carolina Sunrock hired Focus Design Builders, located in Wake Forest, North Carolina, to construct two new buildings that support plant operations and the quarry. The first building houses the quality lab for all activities (asphalt, concrete and aggregate), a break room, a large storage garage and two large maintenance bays for equipment and truck repair. The second building houses the motor control

centers and all operational controls for both plants. The asphalt plant is open for the season for contracting, and we are optimistic the market will be stable. We have added additional employees to ensure that the plant runs smoothly, such as a plant utility position, loader operator, and production manager for the area. In the future, we anticipate adding a plant supervisor position for the area and a quality control position for the testing of the asphalt as well. The plant utilizes the raw materials that the Woodsdale Quarry produces and has the potential to use moderate to high percentages of recycled asphalt.

These fatalities can be avoided, so OSHA conducts this event to create a dialogue between companies and their employees about preventable measures. All companies that participate receive a certificate. As part of the National Safety Stand-Down, our employees focused specifically on "Fall Hazards," anything that can cause an employee to lose their balance, and reinforcing the necessity of "Fall Prevention," measures put into place to ensure that "Fall Hazards" are prevented, to do our part in keeping our employees safe at all times.

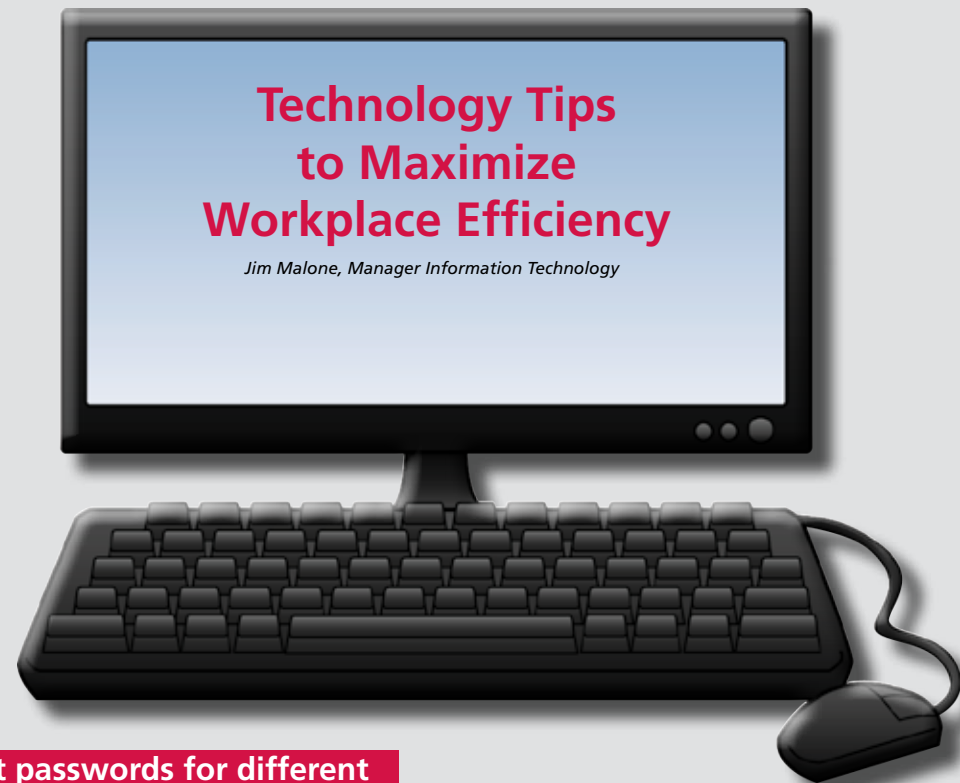

Have different passwords for different security levels

If you have only one password across all of your accounts, you put all of those at risk if one account becomes compromised. The stakes can be high at work, where you may be dealing with sensitive client and/or employee information.

Get to know your IT policies

Spend some time reading the IT policies for your work place. Although there are common threads across most businesses, there will be some nuances that are particular to your job and working environment. Your employer is entitled to monitor your IT use if explicitly stated within the employer's company policy. Being familiar with what you can and cannot do may, at the least, save you a little bit of embarrassment, and even save your job.

Use the automatic save feature in Microsoft Office to protect your projects

There are times when Microsoft Office closes a program before you can save changes to the file you are using. If the power goes out or if one of your programs stops working, you could lose part of the file you were working on. The automatic save feature allows you to save your work more frequently than every fifteen minutes. To enable the automatic save feature, click File, Options, Save and make sure the Save AutoRecover information every x minutes is selected.

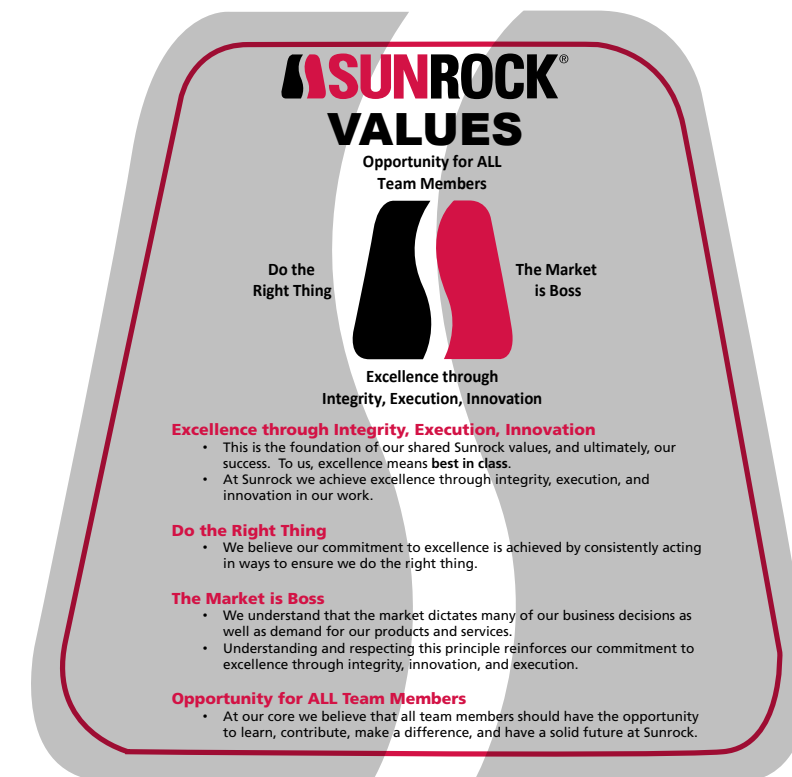
Printer supplies

If you happen to run the printer out of toner or ink, do not leave it for someone else to replace. Do it yourself. If you end up using the last of the printer supplies from the stock cupboard, make sure you tell or email the person responsible for ordering replacements. Don't assume that someone else will do it. The same goes for paper and/or if you see any unusual flashing lights on a printer (they usually mean something).

Large print jobs

If you are going to send a large print job to a printer that will tie it up for more than a few minutes, when possible, do this:

- print on a printer that is rarely used, so it will not be noticed;
- print at a time when others won't mind;
- print after you've given your colleagues a warning.
