Compliance with local, state and federal environmental regulatory standards permits is the backbone of Sunrock's business. Each one of us must do our part to look around our facilities for any problems that might need immediate attention. We must be diligent in treating our facilities grounds as we would our own yards and gardens by routine maintenance, housekeeping, and asking others for help when the cleanup tasks become too large for us to handle alone. A couple of examples of our success in "Doing The Right Thing" are when some of our existing stormwater treatment ponds at our Wake Forest (North Raleigh) asphalt and concrete facility and our Butner Quarry became full of sediment and were no longer meeting their intended purpose of discharging clean water into our adjacent natural environment.

Our staff in the Environmental Department, along with plant personnel and operations supervisors, teamed up with our Contracting Division to meet at each site. We collaborated to determine the cause of the problem and developed a plan of action that our Contracting Division could implement that would result in our stormwater treatment ponds meeting and exceeding their intended purpose - and the requirements in our environmental permits for years to come. Each of our team members are a key component to helping us meet our environmental obligations. You can do this by keeping your facility work areas tidy and clean of loose soil and rocks on a regular basis. This will lessen the strain on these stormwater treatment devices that are critical to maintaining full compliance with our environmental permits

Sunrock has had a solid year in 2022 despite having to deal with rising fuel and material costs, cement shortages in the US and Canada, and inconsistent customer demand. Our safety performance in the US and Canada remained stable and as we move forward into 2023 we all need to continue to put safety first with a particular focus on watching out for our fellow Sunrock team members. In the US, several divisions performed at exceptional levels



in 2022 and I would like to recognize those team members. The Asphalt Divisions led by Mike Heitzman produced a record amount of product while meeting quality performance targets. Our Maintenance Division led by Scott Borchardt improved communications and operations while keeping costs in line with plan despite a record inflationary environment. The US Aggregate Team led by Lee Preddy continued to produce quality products across all the plants. The Butner Quarry had another stellar year while the Kittrell and Woodsdale Quarry Teams continued improving their operating metrics. The Concrete Division led by Keith Batts worked hand in hand with our Quality Department to maintain product quality and began producing and delivering specialty concrete for high-rise construction sites. Our Contracting Division with Nick Beach and Trey Clement leading the paving and grading groups, saw another busy year while maintaining the best safety performance in the history of the Division.

In Canada, we got off to a slow start to the season after a long winter and wet spring but business activity picked up in the 2nd half of the year. Our state-of-the-art Burnt River Quarry has been producing high-quality aggregate that is used in all of our concrete mixes and is sought after by commercial and residential developers in our core markets. Canadian Concrete Operations continue to service our customer base despite being negatively impacted by the regional cement shortage. Under our General Manager Jeremy Lee's leadership we look forward to building on the 2nd half successes as we head into 2023.

As I noted in my spring letter, the Executive Team was tasked by the Board of Directors to complete our 5 year Strategic Plan. The detailed process for building the Plan included analyzing market information, reviewing all of our internal operations, formal review of all business processes, and outlining potential growth opportunities. At the conclusion of the process we determined that in order for Sunrock to continue to grow and prosper, we will be concentrating on the four pillars of our business noted below:

North Hills Redevelopment Project

Sunrock joined Brasfield & Gorrie for a pour at North Hills Mall in Raleigh, continuing work on a project 20 years in the making. This \$350 million project sees Kane Realty Corporation transforming the old JCPenney store into a Restoration Hardware, which will serve as an anchor for the future Main District. Sunrock poured over 400 yards of a high specification 7000 PSI mix which included a hydration stabilizer from our admixture supplier Grace.

The mix was loaded out of our North Raleigh plant at a 3" slump and delivered to the job where our Field Service Department added a Super Plasticizer to bring the mix to a very workable 8" slump for our customer's finishers. Sunrock supplied the concrete at a rate of 90 yards an hour without incident and the concrete set times matched our customer's request. Sunrock is proud to be a part of the Triangle's continued growth.















Henderson-Oxford Airport Rehab

Carolina Sunrock has another airport job under our belts. During the course of 5 days, we supplied P-401 mix to Henderson-Oxford Airport from our Butner HMA Plant while Rifenburg Construction was paving the runway. This job called for about 8500-9000 tons of asphalt, but due to the base being in better condition than expected by airport authority, Rifenburg milled and placed 8180 tons of asphalt. The average daily production for this job was 1580 tons. Falcon Engineering finalized results for Henderson-Oxford Airport Rehab project. Based on the test results, Sunrock and Rifenburg will receive 100% pay.



Airport jobs are not easy ones - but with good planning, help from quarries, operations, production, sales, and quality control, this project was a success. All members of these different departments did an excellent job to make it happen and to make sure that we supplied quality products to our customer. Sunrock's teamwork was on full display and great job to everyone who took part in making this project a success! We would especially like to recognize Synjun Cheek and Taras Fitel for their exceptional performance during this project. Sunrock looks forward to more opportunities to work with Rifenburg on other projects at Henderson-Oxford Airport.






Yonkers Road Improvements

Sunrock's Contracting Division started the Yonkers Road Improvement Project on February 4th 2020. This project focused on 2.3 miles of roadway improvements that begins at Capital Boulevard in Raleigh and ends at the New Bern Avenue intersection. The purpose of this project was to reconstruct the road in its entirety, improve vehicular safety, improve pedestrian and bicycle safety, improve stormwater quality/conveyance, and enhance landscaping. Broken down into 3 phases of work, this project included: grading, installation of new concrete drainage pipe & structures, asphalt paving, concrete curb & gutter, a 10' wide multi-use path, retaining walls, 12 bio-retention cells, and landscape plantings.




The phasing and the sequencing of this project has been a critical component to all of Sunrock's grading, utility, and paving crews. Once each phase has started, Sunrock is required to shift the traffic pattern to a one-way direction (eastbound



only) and then perform all work operations on one side of the road (north bound/ south bound) at a time. Once one side of the road was completed, work commenced on the opposite side. After both sides were completed, traffic was switched back to a two-way. This project had multiple challenges from day one, including phasing and the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, which not

only impacted Sunrock but also our subs and suppliers. Another major challenge encountered were the numerous unknown underground and aerial utility conflicts associated with our work to be performed. With the assistance of Project Engineer Cornelius Cheatham and Superintendent Preston Laney, Sunrock has been able to coordinate with the various utility companies who were able to relocate their conflicting services. This allowed us to maintain our critical path schedule.

The Yonkers Road Improvement Project wrapped up early spring of 2022 due to additional work added to the contract. Foreman John Hunt played a significant role in completing this project. This project would not be a success without all of the support from contributing Sunrock team members, subcontractors, and suppliers.





Duke Energy - Roxboro & Mayo Power Plants

Carolina Sunrock has been working with Trans-Ash & Charah Solutions on the Ash Basin Closure projects located at Mayo Power Plant & Roxboro Power Plant in Roxboro, NC. Sunrock's Woodsdale

Quarry has provided aggregate materials over the past year for both plants to service access roads, erosion control measures, and liner material. At the completion of the remedial work, there will be close to 20 million yards of coal ash moved/capped to ensure environmental compliance. Remedial work at both locations is expected to go into 2030. Sunrock would like to thank Charah Solutions, Trans Ash, and Duke Energy for their ongoing business and look forward to servicing these projects in the coming years.








RDU Taxiway Rehabilitation

Carolina Sunrock has supplied roughly 30,000 tons of aggregates to Summers Constructions Portable Concrete Plant for the rehabilitation of Taxiway B at Raleigh-Durham International Airport (RDU) in Raleigh. We have been servicing this project with aggregates starting in Q2 of 2021.

The aggregates supplied to this Portable Plant are for a 650-flex concrete mix for Taxiway B. This project includes roughly 92,000 SY of new concrete pavement, as well as the construction of new paved shoulders, removal of existing concrete, a subgrade to a depth of 34" and construction. We have also supplied various other FAA spec aggregates for the construction of this project at RDU.



Butner Quarry Primed for Major Role in Carbon Removal

Have you ever heard of "enhanced rock weathering"? Well, to be honest two years ago the Sunrock Soil Systems Team hadn't either. Climate scientists and carbon capture companies from across the US and Europe have been eagerly working with Sunrock over the last couple of years to study, test, and trial this exciting new technology.

Enhanced rock weathering uses basalt from quarries to unlock a powerful tool in the fight for climate change. The process spreads finely crushed basalt rock on agricultural lands where it absorbs and stores carbon dioxide directly from the atmosphere, providing a scalable climate solution and economic opportunities to local farmers. In late-October 2022 the team celebrated the first trucks of Butner rock fines crossing the scales and heading to local properties, where material will be spread and start removing carbon dioxide immediately. This will be the first deployment of its kind in North Carolina.

Let us back up a little bit and walk through how basalt (also known as trap rock) in Butner can be used as part of a carbon solution that locks away carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. Sunrock has the only pure trap rock quarry that is rail-served from Manassas, VA all the way to the Gulf of Mexico. Our Butner quarry mines this extremely durable construction material for use in railroad ballasts, floor tiles, industrial insulation, concrete and asphalt aggregate and more. The trap rock in Butner is loaded with minerals that are proven to help remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere through mineral weathering. The Earth has used the natural process of mineral weathering for billions of years to manage greenhouse gases.

Without going off the deep end in the chemistry, the best comparison I can make is baking soda in the fridge. Many people put a box of baking soda into the fridge to help eliminate odors; but have you considered the chemistry of the baking soda reacting with acidic molecules (odor) and capturing and neutralizing the smell? Probably not. Enhanced rock weathering is a very similar concept, the real trick is that we take the basalt fines and spread them all over agricultural lands to turbocharge the system. This would be similar to spreading the baking soda all over a plate in your fridge to increase the surface area for absorption, instead of just opening the tab.

Another important part of this carbon solution is that the basalt fines help farmers to enhance their soils and grow healthier crops. Basalt is rich in iron, magnesium, phosphorus, calcium, and other micronutrients. The basalt provides a steady nutrient flow on agricultural land as it decomposes over time. A true win-win. Crushed rock fines from Butner quarry can capture and sequester carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and strengthen rural communities by enhancing soil properties to improve crop production.

In September, students from Vance-Granville Community College honed their skills at our Butner training yard as part of the Heavy Equipment Operator (HEO) training program. Alex Madrigal, who instructs HEO Operations Level I at VGCC, accompanied his students to the program and assisted Sunrock managers with the training. This program provides exposure for individuals looking to start a career in the lucrative and ever-growing HEO field. This comprehensive, on the job training program helps students develop additional technical and essential skills in order to successfully transition

into their career and add immediate value to operations. To address the training need, Sunrock has turned to apprenticeship as a means of training employees.

Working alongside Vance-Granville Community College and Apprenticeship NC, Sunrock is developing two additional levels of HEO training for new, current, and future employees. This

pathway will include a level one pre-apprenticeship and provide students with a viable entry pathway to be considered for available apprenticeship spots. Training will be comprehensive, combining classroom simulator and on the job training for individuals chosen to participate. Sunrock is proud to work with VGCC in training students and preparing them for a promising HEO career!


